    - a. **Supervision (requires personnel)**
  - 4. **Restitution**
  - 5. **View offenders as groups-not always just individuals**
  - 6. **Better tracking systems**
  - 7. **Holding juveniles accountable**
  - 8. **Holding parents responsible for juveniles' actions**
- d. **Goal 4: Build Offender Competency and Support Community Reintegration (Tracie Olson, Public Defender)**
- 1) **Stand-alone class in integrity**
  - 2) **Continue recognized relationship with Day Reporting Center (long term)**
  - 3) **"No wrong door"**
  - 4) **Flash incarceration as a treatment tool for compliance (less than 7 days)**
  - 5) **Literacy**
  - 6) **Outreach to alumnis of DRC**
  - 7) **Maintain continuity of services across county**
  - 8) **Integrity workshop – CBT standalone class**
  - 9) **Family support of substitute family system**

- e. **Goal 5: Reduce Recidivism (Chief Cardall)**
- 1) **Identify offenders for whom recidivism is most likely to be avoided through intervention and concentrate resources on them**
  - 2) **Measure recidivism accurately**
  - 3) **Reduce the number of victims**
  - 4) **ASK THE OFFENDERS!! – in particular, ask the offenders WHAT STOPS THEM from staying on the straight and narrow and apply resources to those SPECIFIC problems (wouldn't that give the most cluck for the buck?)**
  - 5) **Allocate resources based on probability of success**
  - 6) **Increase evaluation in mental health, drug/alcohol reduction levels**
  - 7) **Eliminate barriers as a neighborhood**
  - 8) **Resources should be directed at the worst of the worst**

- a) **Establish set of indicators to measure reductions for happening in the worst crime sets**
- b) **Focus on where the cycles of crime are creating the greatest impacts.**
- 9) **Focus on reviewing whether programming and education are having their intended effect**
- 10) **System flexible enough to move offenders up and down the level of sanctions or incentives**
- 11) **Is the definition of recidivism strict enough**
  - a) **Has it been redefined to hide or cover re-offense?**
- 12) **How are the resources being directed to reduce recidivism?**
  - a) **Risk assessments**
  - b) **Focusing resources on high risk offenders**
- 13) **Ask for feedback from offenders**
- 14) **Are mental health/substance abuse addressed?**
  - a) **Can there be more robust assessment for MH/S.A.?**
  - b) **More targeted preventive interventions**
- 15) **Family engagement, family support needed to achieve successful re-entry**
